ADIRONDACK TRAIL

From the Old Erie Canal on the Mohawk River near Fond du Lac to historic Malone, the 188-mile Adirondack Trail presents "the REAL Adirondack Adventure." The route carves its way through the foothills right into the core of the Adirondack Mountains, retracing historic trails across frontiers explored by settlers, soldiers, and early guides. The wilderness landscape is filled with wildlife as you drive or bike up to trailsheads leading to some of the best mountain peaks and canoe routes in the region.
